A level History is about the acquisition of vital learning skills: you need to be able to read and digest large amounts of information and to pick out what is and is not relevant to the question you are dealing with. History will teach you how to analyse, reflect and to argue clearly in class and in writing.

History is mainly examined through written exams at the end of the course. It is essential that you become confident in timed conditions. The majority of questions are concerned with why events occur. There will also be questions that ask you to analyse a source as a piece of evidence.

The coursework element is a extended research project that focuses on researching a range of historical viewpoints on a given era or topic.
